ABOUT THE POLICING PLAN 2025-2030 CONSULTATION

The Policing Plan 2025-2030 will outline what the Royal Anguilla Police Force will deliver over the next 5 years to achieve more Engaged, Safer and Confident communities in Anguilla.

It is vitally important that we focus on the right priorities and are clear about what actions we need to take in order to achieve them.

It is also important that we show what progress we are making, so we will publish a report every year to show how well we are doing to achieve our priorities.

The Policing Plan is being developed using a range of information and evidence, including an analysis of crime trends and patterns of harm caused to individuals and our communities. Your inputs as part of this consultation process are also a vital contribution.

We are seeking your views and this collective information will allow us to develop a Policing Plan that is meaningful, credible and achievable among individuals and communities in Anguilla.

Priorities

These are the things we will focus on to achieve a Safer Anguilla

Success criteria

These will show we are achieving our priorities

Priority 1

Gun crime

Reduce gun crime and tackle gangs and organised crime groups

Success criteria

We will know we have achieved this when we...

- 1.1 Increase the number of illegal weapons and ammunition removed from general circulation
- 1.2 Increase the number of children engaging in anti-gang programmes in schools
- 1.3 Reduce the number of firearms related incidents including death or injury
- 1.4 Increase the number of forensic examinations to support successful prosecutions
- 1.5 CCTV evidence used in the prosecution of gun related crime



Priority 2

Road Safety

Reduce the number of collisions and number of seriously injured on the road

Success criteria

We will know we have achieved this when we...

- 2.1 Reduce the number of collisions on the roads
- 2.2 Reduce the number of people who are killed or seriously injured on the roads
- 2.3 Increase the number of driver interactions for driving offences/ behaviours
- 2.4 Increase the number of high visibility police road checks



Priority 3

Community Led Policing

Create a force that is accessible, responsive, visible and victim-focused

Success criteria

We will know we have achieved this when we...

- 3.1 Increase the number of reports provided to the RAPF Confidential Website www.gov.ai/911
- 3.2 Recruit to ensure organisational structures for community policing are appropriately and consistently resourced
- 3.3 Increase the number of engagements on RAPF social media platforms
- 3.4 Increased reporting of crime



Priority 4

Safeguarding

Safeguard vulnerable persons

Success criteria

We will know we have achieved this when we...

- 4.1 Increase reporting of sexual abuse and domestic violence
- 4.2 Give greater support to victims and witnesses including use of the new special measures and questioning techniques to better enable vulnerable witnesses to give evidence
- 4.3 Make more timely referrals to relevant agencies of those at risk
- 4.4 Increase in the use of Administration of Justice Act provisions for vulnerable witnesses

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Priority 5

Police Professionalism

Build greater confidence in the honesty, integrity and professionalism of the police

Success criteria

We will know we have achieved this when we...

- 5.1 Increase the percentage of victims updated within 10 days
- 5.2 Increase the number of internal Police Discipline Panels concluded in a timely fashion
- 5.3 Increase the number of RAPF Officers who are vetted
